# New Building for Lami Gospel Begins...



Thirteen people from Te Awamutu Bible Chapel, about half of them teenagers, spent two weeks in Lami, Fiji building the foundations for Lami Gospel Assembly's Chapel in July of this year. The team was under the direction of Bill and Pam Todd, who work for MMM. Everyone in the team worked really hard. We spent days digging all the holes for the foundation poles and moved literally tonnes of earth in wheelbarrows. The ground was really muddy and soft and slippery and as you dug deeper than 500mm water would start welling up in the holes. As most of the holes had to be 1metre deep, we were working ankle to knee deep in water or slush half of the time - it was fun! There were three Fijian guys from the church there who spent a lot of time working with us. They were amazing and inspired our whole team. We had a couple of experienced builders on the team, but most of us were just "plebs" working under orders. No one complained about anything (except the giant spider in the toilet). We had a couple of really hot days, but most of the time the weather was quite tolerable. We got

all the foundations dug and the posts in, but unfortunately couldn't concrete the posts in as Fiji had run out of cement. Praise God concrete has since arrived and was poured at the end of July. All of the team members had an amazing time and are all keen to go back and help with another stage of the project.

Melanie - I enjoyed being in a Christian environment where every day we had devotions and prayed together.  
 Hayden - I loved meeting amazing people who were hard working and loyal to God.  
 Jason - It was cool getting to know people.  
 Craig - They had amazing church services with so little equipment.  
 Justin - Everyone should go on a mission to a less fortunate country. It was amazing how happy they are with practically nothing.  
 Ben - I appreciated the Fijian people's loving and serving hearts. I was totally blown away by their love for others.  
 Anna - I loved the mud and the sweat. The best thing though, was hearing the team pray

and seeing them reading God's Word and looking after each other.

Paige - It was great being with cool people who love God so much.

Jordan - The crazy thing was "Fiji time". We'd get there at 6 pm for dinner and be ready to eat at 7.45 pm. They are so relaxed.

Kevin - Thanks God for choosing all of us to go. It's awesome being part of God's family. I think I've been bitten for mission work. I hope the chapel we started building for them will end up being too small because of an abundance of people coming to God in Fiji.

# Work Reports

## North Island

David Halse and Rod Heape

One of the original aims of MMM was “serving those who serve”. With this in mind the work team, David Halse, Rod Heape and Haapi Wilson assisted by local helpers, painted the interior of Russell Embling’s house in Auckland for a few days in late May/June. Russell is the pastor of the Birkenhead Community Church.

In June Rod returned to Australia for a few weeks as a close relative passed away and Haapi Wilson took up a teaching position at a local college for the remainder of the year. So with Rod and Haapi gone and Ian Cross still off work recovering from cancer treatment, David found he was the only person available to go to YWAM, Family Ministries in Matamata. But God provided eleven helpers! Thanks to Fraser Barrett, Andrew Gillingham, Gary Hoekstra, John Langhorn, Peter Robinson, Peter Seaton, Maurice Turner, Barry and Jenny Utting and Arnold and Molly Winterburn for all your help on this project. The team was able to insulate and line ceilings in five accommodation units and also paint the interiors.

When Rod returned from Australia, he and David made a couple of trips to ‘His International Ministries’, Glen Innes, Auckland. They were putting up framing and lining ‘transit’ accommodation in an old factory which is leased by a church to house needy people and Bible School students.

During the first week of the July school holidays the team sound proofed areas for the Hamilton Christian School music department. Betty Diprose, music teacher at the school wrote: “You will have no idea what your knowledgeable, efficient and cheery contributions mean to me and to our music students. Every music space has been ‘pumping’ since we started back at school... all flowing happily in our newly sound proofed rooms. Your company and stories were inspirational and refreshing.” Thanks to Stuart Foote for organising the project and working with the team, also Fraser Barrett and Callum Mason.

Charles and Ruth Sundgren were one of the two couples who helped establish MMM in New Zealand back in 1994. They resigned from MMM in 1999 and have since served with the Barnabas Fund both in New Zealand and in England. During this time they have not had their own home, but are thankful to God that they have been able to purchase a half-built house in Whangaparaoa. MMM was pleased to be able to spend a couple of weeks in August assisting the Sundgrens to line the interior of this house. Thanks to Roland Richards for helping on this project.

Next was a long trip south to renovate and transform a bunkroom into four rooms for Urban Vision at Ngatiawa, a small camp/retreat in the hills behind Waikanae. Maurice Turner travelled from Matamata and Rob and Stephanie Ray from Tawa were welcome helping hands. Stephanie was able to sew new mattress covers for the camp. On the last night the people from the Ngatiawa Community sang a song to the team and gave each person (men included) a bunch of flowers and a cake of chocolate. The song was about MMM which they had made up to Michael Jackson’s tune: ‘Heal The World’. Here are the words they wrote.....

## South Island

The work at Tirohanga Presbyterian Camp back in June went well. It was mainly lining the main hall, but there were also two smaller rooms off the main hall which also needed relining and painting so they could use them for accommodation. It was a great time there; John and his wife Shelley were brilliant and looked after us very well. A beast was killed for us for meat, so no grocery bill for the month while we were there! We had most meals together and it was good to have lots of help on the job from Dave and Joy Kennedy, Clive and Esther Dennis, Bart and Muriel Gilmore, Rose-Mary Hunt and a few local helpers. The roof needed a lot of cleaning out, scrubbing and a new coat of paint; batts for insulation put in and walls relined and painted. Ernie Pene did a great job of sanding and varnishing the floors. It came up really good, the lower walls in a dark red colour, as there will be many rough games in there and it will get well used.



In early July we went to En Hakkore, Ranfurly (see above) where we were able to install new windows in one of the smaller blocks - that was an answer to prayer. Alan had been able to get the windows from a school in Christchurch which was being demolished and a man from Rangiora had said that if Alan and a few guys came to help for the day they could have the windows for free. The windows had been sitting at En Hakkore for about 6 months so Alan really wanted to get them in place before they deteriorated in the weather. It looked great, they fitted perfectly, and when

they get it finished it will be a great building for smaller groups to use. We had the Gilmores there as well as Rose-Mary and the Penes.



Later in the month it was on to Camp Columba, in Pukerau, near Gore, where their camp hall needed similar treatment to Tirohanga Camp. It needed relining and painting and the walls and ceiling were insulated too. It will also be a much warmer and cosier space for campers to enjoy the log burners without the heat getting instantly lost. Again, a great lot of helpers; Peter Fitzgerald, Stan Zwies, the Kennedys, Dennis', Gilmores, Rose-Mary, and local helpers and board members.

Then, the Penes headed north to work at the Tasman Bay Christian School near Nelson for August and then return to work in the North Island. Bart and Alan drove into Gore from Pukerau for three days to work at the Gore Baptist Church. Their kitchen was pretty tired looking and needed benches ripped out and new ones installed. Doors also needed to be changed around and some walls were relined.

I'm writing this from Riversdale, where we are helping the Presbyterian Church (Waimea Christian Trust) to make renovations to their church house in preparation of a new youth pastor moving in. We have the Dennis', Gilmores, Stan Zwies, and Dave Kennedy, and Tom Faulkner helping us here. We expect to be here until the end of August when we will then take extended leave for the rest of this year to work on our house in Waimate and consider our future involvement with MMM.

# An Australian Adventure

Why are we here? Our teenagers wouldn't leave home in Nelson, NZ, so we have. Why stay in the cold winter when we can escape to a warmer climate. Depending on the day we have a dozen different reasons for being here. God has given us the ability to do practical things and a love of sharing what we have seen Him do. Our first real MMM experience was a month in China some years ago, converting an old factory into an orphanage. We loved the people and the work, but struggled with the food and for two people who love talking; the language barrier was a problem. So far we have found that if we talk slowly the Aussies can understand us. We were slightly reluctant to leave our family, friends and church at Richmond. I have wanted to do this for years, so closed my electrical business for 4 months and we left. Arriving in Australia on the 2nd May, we went looking for a caravan and tow vehicle. Trying to buy anything over here is really difficult if you don't have a permanent address. On 17th May we joined a crowd of MMMers at Wye for the opening of their NSW headquarters. On the following Monday we moved to the first project at the WEC camp/training facility at Morrisset, NSW. We lined a bunkhouse and repaired the toilets. While there they were having their annual worldwide leadership summit so we had the chance to meet some very interesting people. We got through the work slightly quicker than expected so Mel and I left one day early and went the long way via the Hunter region to the Cornerstone property at Canowindra. The locals quickly and emphatically informed us it's not Can-o-wind-ra, but Ca-NOW-indra. Cornerstone is a residential discipleship course; the students have to work in the community and study. As before, maintenance work, painting, alterations etc. Once again we got away early and took the very long way via Broken Hill to Hilston. Direct it is something like 250kms but we did approximately 1400 and saw some amazing country and met some neat people. At White Cliffs, an amazing moonscape of old opal mines and underground houses, we visited a gallery selling opals and the owner was an MMMer. At Broken Hill we parked at the old convent which had been done up by an MMM team. We did a very long drive the next day to get back to our 'family', yes we had only met them a month before but that is what they were to us. We are very much the babies of the team at only 54. The core of the team is 4 couples and a single man, Pete and Kate from Tasmania late 50s early 60s, retired from the police. Then there's Les and Pam Whiley 70s, Les a handy man, Pam our prayer warrior and time keeper. She has an amazing story of being unable to think for herself for 20 years after suffering a stroke and how God has healed her. She still has no



use of one arm and one leg, but her scooter takes her most places and her love for others and her Lord is amazing. John 73, retired scaffolder rigger keeps an eye on the safety, and is a dab hand with the paint brush. Phil and Gwen took retirement about 4 years ago and after doing the tourist thing for 6 months and meeting MMMers and hearing about what they had done, joined up and have been on the road with them for the last two years. From the building trade, they are our leaders and do a great job keeping us busy and happy. Others come and go from the team and it's almost like we have known them for years. This reminds us that we are all God's family. Hilston Baptist was built about 50 years ago and Stan who had been an apprentice then, came back to help. We replaced all the old cast iron windows, built new back steps, and painted the whole building inside and out. It was the talk of the town. We also got to visit a couple of local farms, 33,000ha in crop, with 16,000 sheep to clean up around the edges.

Once again we did our 'get away early' routine and went to the Hillsong conference, then rejoined the 'family' at Cobbitty Teen Ranch, where we have restored a two story historic brick building. Then went to Wedderburn and disconnected the kitchen, left the 'family' and travelled 860kms to Victoria to help the bush fire victims with fencing, this is a joint project with Samaritans Purse. They needed workers with their own accommodation. Our van is in what remains of a farmer's shed. They are MMM Associates who lost their house, fences, camper, winter feed, and her parents were killed, a huge ongoing need.

If you want to take over from us we would be happy to rent you our van as we have to return to NZ at the end of August.

# NEW APPOINTMENTS

**Bill and Pam Todd (MMM Fulltime Associates)** arrived in Fiji on the 30th May to take on the role of MMM Fiji Project Coordinators. Their interest in Fiji began in 2007 when they joined a team going to Fiji for two weeks to help upgrade



accommodation at the Lami Gospel Fellowship, near Suva. They returned a year later with another couple to upgrade the water storage at Lami and added two new water tanks for the church. Upon their return to New Zealand, they realised God was challenging them to return to Fiji for a longer period of time.

Bill and Pam had previously been mobile in NZ with their caravan for over a year and had planned to continue as mobiles. Last year Pam took on the Treasurers role with the MMM Board and was very involved with processing the MMM accounts. However God was challenging them to take on the work in Fiji and placed a real desire in their hearts to help our Pacific neighbours.

Early this year they got as many of their affairs sorted as they could, stored their caravan and vehicles, packed their tools (and Pam's sewing machine) and headed to Sabeto. Their first major project was back at the Lami church where they had worked previously - this time with a team from Te Awamutu, to start the foundations for a new church building.

Bill and Pam are a very capable couple and MMM is blessed to have them in Fiji. There are many projects coming up over the coming months and on into next year so they can expect to be kept quite busy. They will return to NZ at the end of November for commitments here and then head back to Fiji early January 2010. Pam continues to manage the MMM accounts from Fiji and participates in the Board meetings via Skype, MMM is very grateful for technology – especially when it works!
