COFFEE AND A CHAT

"Why do you do what you do?" You may have to read that sentence twice! It's not an easy sentence, or an easy question, but one worth the time it takes to answer it. The following conversation, had by an MMM Volunteer at a coffee shop, shows a great reason of why we at MMM do what we do.

Val and I were having coffee at a cafe in Te Kauwhata recently with an acquaintance from the local gym. She is definitely not a Christian but she is a nice person.

In the course of our conversation I snuck in some stuff about MMM (always a good non-confrontational way to get our Saviour into the talk!). Later on she asks "So, did you ever work on that camp out the back of Ngaruawahia - I think it's a religious one?".

"Why, yes," says I, describing two sweaty weeks of sanding the underside of varnished bunks when we were refurbishing six of the bunkrooms.

"Well" she says, "that is a great camp. A few years ago I dragged one of my sons there to spend a week because I'd heard it could smarten him up, and boy, did he need smartening up. He really fought not to go but I didn't give him the option - it was now or never. When I went back to collect him he was a different boy, he



went there as a 14 year old brat and left a week later as an 18 year old young man, and he hasn't looked back. Before that he was lazy and careless. This year he started a computer science degree course at Auckland Uni. It only happened because of that camp!"

I remember that job. I remember lying on my back sanding the bunks with my eyes, ears, nose and throat full of sweat and dust. I remember thinking to myself, "In two weeks time a bunch of kids are going to be in this bunkroom. They will be totally oblivious to the fact that it has been completely refurbished. Their enjoyment and their experience of this consecrated place will be all the better for what MMM is doing here now. They won't know, but you know God, and I know, and that's what makes MMM special, that's what makes MMM such a blessing. Thank you God, you're the best!"

Just thought you'd like to know, the blessing that MMM is.

MMM JOURNEY

MMM warmly welcomes David and June Gennard (Short-Term Volunteers) who have made the move to the MMM Centre, with Dave taking the role of Project Co-ordinator. Here June shares

Dave's first experience with MMM was in 2012 at Ngatiawa River Monastery, on the Kapiti Coast in the Wellington region. We had heard about the organisation whilst attending Parachute Music Festival a few years earlier. At Ngatiawa he spent the week helping the MMM Team to build an extension to one of the properties at the Monastery. This lit a fire in Dave's heart for MMM, so much so he wanted to sell up the family home and go on the road! At this stage I wasn't too sure about this and the idea was put aside. However, I did go on the next project with Dave the following year!

Whilst I was away visiting family in the UK, Dave invited Howard Robinson (MMM Director) for a meal. On my return from the UK, Dave suggested we should start a prayer group at our house. So, Dave set about contacting supporters of MMM in the Wellington area inviting folk to come along to our home once a month to pray. In 2013 a small number of people joined us to pray

We wanted the group to be about prayer and hospitality so we decided we would begin each evening with a sweet treat - thus the group became known as 'Pudding and Prayer'. Although we didn't sell up and go on the road straight away, we have spent our time praying for the work and those who regularly volunteer on jobs.

As well as praying for the work of MMM, Dave and I would spend part of our annual holidays working on projects around the North Island.

Recently, one of the items we regularly prayed about, was for the need for a Project Co-ordinator. Dave would often comment how he would love to do this. However, he had a job, and we would

have to relocate to another part of New Zealand, to Pirongia. June was reminded that when you pray, God

may prompt you to realise you may be the answer to the prayer. For various reasons Dave decided to take early retirement from his job with NZTA. Meanwhile, our children had been encouraging us to downsize and to buy a smaller property. But where to live? We couldn't decide where we wanted to live, but we did feel it was the right time for us to work with MMM for a season. In January 2020 whilst working on a project in Hamilton, we had a conversation with Howard and Ave about working with them and moving to Pirongia.

After a few renovations on our property it went on the market in March, 10 days before level 4 lockdown. We had few people view the property but with the uncertainty around Covid-19 no offers were made. We decided to leave the house listed during the various levels of lockdown. Eventually, the house sold at the end of June; six weeks later we moved to Pirongia just as Auckland was going back into level 3 and the rest of the country went into level 2. We have moved to the MMM Centre into a two bedroom unit called, "Zambia" – that's helped with our downsizing a lot!

Although we are mainly based at the MMM Centre, we hope to be involved in a few projects.

IF YOU WANT TO WALK ON WATER ...

YOU GOTTA GET OUT OF THE BOAT!

Does MMM intrigue you? Have you always wanted to step out in faith and do something kind of big for God? Use your skills and passion to serve Him? But maybe it seems a little too crazy to actually do it? Our challenge to you is just do it, get out of the boat and give it a go ... what do you really have to lose?!

It was a bit of a journey for our family working towards becoming full time volunteers for MMM. It was something we had definitely felt God calling us to for a while. But does leaving paid employment and the comfort and security of our own home and community to 'live by faith', travelling around the North Island before moving to Fiji really make sense? The answer, by worldly standards is, "No, not at all" ... but when God is in it, it makes complete sense.

This year, for our family, it has been all about getting out of the boat to walk on water. We have often felt we have had a whole bunch of people watching us do this too; watching to see if we would walk or sink. As the year has gone on we see more and more that as long as we keep our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith, though the storms may rage around us, we will keep afloat.

Right back when Roy first started his building apprenticeship, he did it so he would have a trade he could use to serve God with. Working in the commercial building world never really gave him any satisfaction.

Last year we spent a month in Fiji, taking leave without pay to go. We were able to completely change peoples lives in that month. We thought it was going to be a bit of a financial sacrifice for our family but figured that the benefits would outweigh the sacrifice. Yet somehow we came back with exactly the same amount of money we left with, despite spending a month there with no pay.

God continues to amaze, surprise and bless our family in our experiences and in our finances (even in a global financial crisis).



I have come to be more and more secure in the fact that God has got this; the finances are sorted. We joke that even when we try to give money away, we can't. We have had experiences this year of giving money away generously, only to be blessed with more ourselves.

It's not all about the money though and there are definitely still hard and tricky times, but we know that when we keep our eyes on Jesus and are obedient to His call when He says "Come" we can walk on water!

Obedience isn't easy, it doesn't come naturally. Stepping out in faith is scary. There are a lot of "what if's?" but it's not until you take the "faith step" that God can work.

Don't wait until you know all the answers - that may never happen, your ducks may never all be in a row. Give your firsts to God. The Bible speaks many times about how he always equips those that he calls.

This year our family haven't been the only ones to start with MMM. After Lejf Pedersen stepped out in faith to be a full time volunteer with MMM his thoughts were, "How come nobody else has done this? Where is everyone else?" realising it was a lot easier than he first thought. James Pask who has worked for MMM for six years states, "I wish I had done it earlier".


Hamilton Samoan AOG
