### Festival One

I've been on projects where MMM have been building offices, fixing camp cabins, painting a house and church, building decks, laying concrete,putting a roof on a *fale* shelter at a Christian school, building a carport and much more.

I really enjoyed working at Hope Rising Farm in Ngaruawahia as I learnt lots of new skills, worked in crazy mud, and had some cool people to work alongside. It was cool to see animals being used to interact with children to help them.

When we go on projects, it's great seeing the different church groups and organisations helping and serving people in the community and reaching out to people in need. You should get involved with helping too. You just need to smile, be willing to learn new things and have a good heart attitude, and be happy to help.

It's so good to meet new people on MMM projects too. The people we help are super grateful for the work MMM does and we never go hungry because they show their gratefulness by feeding us good food and looking after us.

Our family were grateful to be able to spend a few weeks in New Zealand over summer and we were blessed to be able to attend the New Wine Festival in Masterton during this time. MMM had a stand in the missions area that Steven Senn and Chris Pynenburg were on. Although we weren't at New Wine to represent MMM, we still spent some time at the stand

MMM had an attention grabbing activity set up which was especially popular with the kids. It was a challenge about how many hits it



would take to get a nail in.

At one point in the weekend, Roy and Steven were chatting while kids were hitting nails when Roy asked them, "None of your dad's are builders are they?" to which one boy replied, "Nah, my dad only treats timber." Roy immediately got excited saying, "Is he here? Go get him. I need to talk to him."

The boy dutifully ran and got his dad. This was the beginning of lots of conversations in person and on email with Roy learning some really helpful information that he can use to guard against termites in Fiji. Roy was then able to find some of the chemicals he was recommended for killing and repelling termites in Fiji! Considering this information is still very much unknown in Fiji, this was a God ordained conversation for Roy to have while on the MMM stand at New Wine! - Roy & Rachael Hogan, Josh, Gabrielle and Kelepi (The Hogan family are NZCMS mission partners, partially supported by Anglican Missions.)

We added the MMM scaffolding and ladders to the job and got stuck in as well, adding to the painting team.



# Thanks MMM from the Caversham Community Church

We are an Open Brethren Heritage Church called Caversham Community Church. Now associated with CCCNZ (Christian Community Churches of NZ). We are a small congregation located in Caversham, Dunedin, which is a lower socio-enconomic area.

We are still in a building that was purchased from the Baptist church in 1908. The church building was built around 1886.

We asked for assistance from MMM because the projects we needed to do were just a little beyond us - actually very daunting. We were quite afraid of the costs involved in undertaking such projects in today's economy. As it turned out, enlisting the help of MMM was a huge success, not only because of the costs saved (scaffolding alone would have been a fortune), but also because of the huge motivating factor that we desperately needed.

Finance aside, it was great working with a team of fellow Christians. The small core MMM team that stayed for the two or so weeks were just the tip of the iceberg. MMM contacts came for anything from a day to a week. There were about 13 in total. Add to that the six or seven people from other local churches and the members of the Cook Island church which uses our building, along with the crew from our congregation and we had about 40 people volunteering their time. One day we had 18 people (who had come to serve) at the lunch table!

### **TRIBUTES**



Colin was in his 60's when he began working with MMM. Most missions, Colin and his wife Barbara observed, wanted teachers, preachers, evangelists, doctors and nurses - no one wanted builders. But Colin came to understand that God wasn't asking him to preach or teach. But still Colin protested! "What is that in your hand?" God asked. "Building skills," was Colin's answer.

"Well, that's what I need right here," was God's reply. Still Colin wondered, "Am I not too old to be starting something like this?

"No," God said and reminded Colin that Moses was 80. So, in their later years Colin and Barbara sold their house, bought a caravan and set off volunteering with MMM. They loved it! It was incredibly fulfilling. Reflecting on their time with MMM, Colin said, "Those six years were some of the most fulfilling of my life, because I knew I was specifically using what God had put in my hand to serve Him."





Initially it was Stuart who had the heart's desire to serve with MMM; it was with trepidation Maryanne joined a team. But once she had been to Fiji and discovered she could enjoy being on a team by supporting and encouraging others and creating an atmosphere of fellowship she returned and encouraged others to also go.
