### LETTER FROM THE

Director June 2024

The leaves have fallen off the MMM grapevine in the orchard and so it's time for the winter prune. I enjoy tending to the grapevine, being part of the process from a lifeless looking vine, seeing the new growth form and the branches extend, the development of little bunches of grapes, keeping the branches trimmed to get the goodness of the vine moving into the fruit, through to a vine laden with grapes and enjoying their goodness.

It reminds me of the illustration that Jesus gives in John 15 being paralleled to our lives in Christ.



"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit.... Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me." John 15:1-4

Christ is the vine and we are the branches. A vine needs branches to bear fruit. But before we get all boastful about that, let's keep in mind a quote from Rev Andrew Murray, "A branch is simply a bit of wood, brought forth by the vine for the one purpose of serving it in bearing its fruit."

We have one purpose – to bear fruit. We have been redeemed to bear fruit for the vine and the purposes of the vinedresser. But we have no ability to produce that fruit unless we draw on the sap of the vine. The vine is our source and our strength; it is strong, we are weak and nothing without the vine.

May we sense the sap of Christ flowing through us, empowering us for each and every activity.

You will read of God's good hand in people's lives and the bearing of fruit that we desire which has been enabled by the sap of Christ, and for the glory of the vinedresser – God the Father.

The MMM (Fiji) Trustees - with the full support of the MMM NZ Board, are looking at the suitability and viability of the property.

The offer of this farm to MMM has been a clear answer to prayer, but there are challenges to work through, a significant one will be

to ensure that suitable housing to meet the future needs of MMM are permissible for the type of lease the property is under.

Funding will be required, both for the purchase of the farm assets and the lease for the land, as well as to build the accommodation, so we will be looking to our Heavenly Father to supply our needs through our MMM supporters.

In April we had a small but skilled team of tradesmen join us for a week at Oasis Farm in Sabeto to help the fight against the relentless termite! Paul and Max joined us from Auckland and Jordi and

Reuben came from YouBuild in Nelson. We are grateful for the ongoing partnership with this building company which is consistently sending us great builders. We also had Sevu, Kenneth, Liki and Roy on the job. The team was replacing doors, timber piles and cabinets affected by the termites as well as new gutters, drains, a concrete footpath and more.

We then had a team of six from Morrinsville Baptist join us for a week in May, completing

'Part A' of a larger maintenance programme for Sabeto Christian Camp - another team is scheduled there in August. The main task was demolishing and rebuilding the kitchen in the camp manager's house which was in a poor condition. This was a great project to have an electrician and a plumber for and we kept them busy in their trades at the house and with lots of general maintenance around the camp, which was a huge blessing. The mechanic in the team also did some work on all three vehicles we have in our care at the moment, which was amazing.

The Asian Subterranean Termite (AST) was discovered in Fiji in 2009 and is a growing concern, causing devastating damage to timber structures primarily in the 'red zones' of Lautoka and Labasa, but

spreading to many other areas now, such as Sabeto. Basic knowledge on prevention and monitoring is unknown to those that need it most. Appropriate building materials (e.g. concrete piles) are not available and revised building code practices are not in place. They are typically found in colonies inside or near large trees and can forage up to 50m in all directions.

Recently we met with the Sabeto Christian

Camp management in the unit there that MMM was based in until 2022. Roy was describing how it is hard to tell if termites are active in the building, but one way is to squeeze timber like architraves. If they have already been there a while it will be hollow. As he demonstrated this on the windows in the room, it disintegrated before us all and termites came out of the hole! It was completely unexpected to us, but shows how difficult it is with this issue. We had Biosecurity Fiji spray several windows and trees around the camp where we have found active termites but at the time of writing, the access point to the building and extent of damage is unknown.

Roy is in the process of implementing monitoring and baiting systems for Sabeto Christian Camp, Oasis Farm and several individuals we know who are affected. Please pray for success so that these ministries and people can find the sneaky critters outside the home and prevent future damage.

### Ham South Baptist, Hamilton

This term started with a hiss and roar, and continued that way.

The MMM team and volunteers joined with White Wood Homes to build a huge deck for Hamilton South Baptist Church. What a great combined team that worked hard and well together, and played hard together. The reigning table tennis champion is Mason from White Wood Homes.

The job started with demolition of the old, almost dangerous, tiny deck and stairway, and moved from ground level up to a full huge deck, safety rails, stairs, concrete path, decorative slats and shade sails.

**Totara Springs Christian** Centre, Matamata



From Hamilton we moved on to Totara Springs, just outside of Matamata. This was a three week job where we stripped the wallpaper out of ten motel units of varying sizes and repainted the rooms. It sounds

quick and easy, right?! Not so much. First •job, pull the outer layer of wallpaper off,



next using spray bottles and steam pads, scraping all the under layer and glue off, sanding, filling holes, more sanding, cutting in and rolling the undercoat then two layers of top coat. Then came putting cupboards back on walls, screwing switches back on, cleaning and setting the furniture back up in the rooms. It looked

amazing once it was finished - but it seems we went too fast. We still had a few days left, so it was on to finishing the top coat on the sports camp office as well as some internal wiring, sanding down metal posts and repainting them. The project went well, with the team being joined by a couple of the Totara Springs maintenance staff. ### Tirau Community Church,

After Totara Springs the team moved not far down the road to Tirau Co-operating Church. Their church is right in the middle of Tirau and right next to the bus stop where all the tourist buses park. At the back of the church is a large L shaped hall that was moved on to the property in the 80's. Painting the exterior

was a huge job. We scraped, sanded and waterblasted, we undercoated and top coated, we cut in around a myriad of doors and windows. There was a huge amount of scaffolding in two layers. Part of the roof was replaced and some of it was painted. On wet days we moved inside and prepared and painted part of the kids area

including brightly coloured doors.

The church members there were amazing. We had a crew of five regulars, mostly semiretired farmers (because farmers never fully retire) and a couple of others that came as often as they could.

The ladies each tried to outdo each other with meals and we had a lovely farewell dinner at the end. This community was amazing and we could feel the love that permeates from this church. He didn't really feel like eating an ice-cream, but sensed he should stop at the ice-cream shop. While purchasing the ice-cream, the seller asked where he had come from. Being a keen MMMer he started to explain about the project in Karamea and volunteering with MMM. Suddenly the person behind the counter got engaged with the conversation, because, although Karamea was a two and half hours drive from this ice-cream shop, at the end of a dead end road, she had driven past that week and assumed someone had bought the building to live in and had their friends there doing it up! ### Celebrate Messiah, Punakaiki



Celebrate Messiah Punakaiki is a backpacker hostel that cares for Israeli travellers that come here to stay. They share the gospel with them, befriend them and most of all make them welcome and celebrate their Jewish heritage. Our project was to reclad the main accommodation building. Alan and I brought a heap of scaffolding from Waimate which came in very handy and

saved money for the ministry. Our trailer was packed to the gunnels with scaffolding poles, the essential trail bike and kayak for weekend recreation and for the energetic, like Alan, night-time kayaking after work up the Pororari River. We were here about

a month and got heaps of work done. Thankfully we had many helpers. Alan and I arrived first, and got the project underway then others joined us for whatever time they could throughout the project. A guy from Greymouth and four of his sons came to help one Saturday. They read about the project in the Homeschool Newsletter and wanted to help.

There was a lot to be done, firstly removing all the cladding and removing windows.

Then it was onto re-cladding it all; there was scraping of old paint on the deck and eaves and heaps of insulation to be put in the walls before the new cladding went on. The old concrete block work around the base also needed a fresh coat of paint. The interior needed work as well. Chris did a lot of plastering and sanding and there were new windows that needed new beads and they all needed painting. The rooms downstairs needed new windows and the guys were also stripping off gib, fixing leaks and fixing the new windows into bathrooms and bedrooms.



Then Tom arrived when Alan needed help with removing all the screws from the roof and rescrewing the whole roof off, as well as giving it a fresh coat of paint.

Sophie and the girls there did a great job of feeding us and I got to bake morning and afternoon teas, which I feel is my gifting. We played games of Upwords in the evenings and gave Chris lots of laughs with Femmy trying to teach left handed me how to cast on the European way right handed. It was crazy, and sadly I think I've forgotten again, so more fun times ahead Femmy! The site is rather spectacular. I've always wanted to

have a bach by the sea but I came home and told the family. "That place is too close to the sea for my liking", which surprised them! We got it done before the worst of the weather came through so that was good. All in all, a great job done and dusted. -
