## Orama, Great Barrier Island

## A MUM AND DAUGHTER MMM EXPERIENCE

Over a year ago, my daughter Darnica (now 14) and I had filled in the paperwork and were waiting to get tickets booked for the October school holidays MMM Camp Orama painting project, but this wasn't to be as, once again, Covid restrictions put this project on hold. A year later MMM emailed to say the Camp Orama project was back on for this year's October holidays and asked if we were still keen? Of course we were! So we booked to go for a week and were looking forward to visiting and volunteering on this island we had never been to. Some of us flew there, and some were brave and took the 4 1/2 hour voyage on the ferry.

The task for the two weeks was to prep and paint the exterior of the cabins. There were also some minor repairs to do on some rotten boards.

Additionally, there was an old woolshed that the Orama staff wanted to convert into an art studio/creative space. With some new second hand windows already installed, Marty and Martyn were assigned to that job, along with the help of other staff and volunteers. This job was challenging in that the frames and trusses weren't straight. Ply was to be used to clad the outside and also used on the interior walls. With some clever thinking and workmanship the guys did an amazing job and the old woolshed was starting to look like new!

The rest of us had the job of scraping, sanding, filling and painting the exterior of the cabins on the hillside. First of all, we had to clear all the plants growing up against the walls, water blast, find and erect some scaffold.

With eight of us and one of the staff members on the job, we all got stuck in and transformed the little green cabins on the hillside to dark grey cabins with white trim. The weather was quite terrible to say the least! However, this did not dampen our spirits or hinder our work too much. When it was rainy we worked under the verandah, when there was strong winds, we wore more layers. When it rained constantly (one afternoon), we went and found another inside job to do. We continued whatever the weather and made great progress.

I am told that the weather improved a lot for the second week so the project was almost completed in the two weeks with only the railings to finish.

But it doesn't finish there! I would like to tell you about Camp Orama and being part of the community there. Camp Orama, which is near the Northern tip of the Island, is isolated, off the grid, quiet and peaceful and has its own beautiful bay and jetty. Orama is at Karaka Bay and surrounded by hills covered with bush.

On our first afternoon at camp, the tide was in, the waters were blue and calm, and a pod of dolphins came through the bay. My



daughter and I felt blessed to witness this. Later, we went out kayaking and were blown away by the number of stingrays we paddled past!! Another day, as the tide came in, we were delighted

to see an octopus just below the jetty. Visits to the jetty on breaks quickly became our routine, anticipating what we may see next under the water!

Even though the area is isolated, there was no lack of happy community within the camp. The staff and other volunteers were so friendly, inclusive and spiritually encouraging. They included us in their daily devotions at morning tea time, they also had a worship night, and an island dinner night where any others from the island were invited to dinner. All the while they fed our group, all staff/volunteers and other campers who were booked in for the week. Their love, hospitality and heart for God were truly encouraging.

Not only that, but being with other MMM volunteers was great too. As many of us had never met, we were able to enjoy getting to know each other and make new friends. This was a positive aspect of going on the project.

My daughter and I had a really awesome week away and will always remember this experience with great fondness. We can't wait for our next MMM project!

studio, demolished a kitchen in a Bible School and been part of restoring it to working order. There's even been a project on a tiny house for a pastor and his family. Such a variety!

We've been to Thames, Ngaruawahia, Te Awamutu, Pirongia, Cambridge, Tauwhare, Hamilton, Katikati, Karapiro, Great Barrier Island, Kaipaki, Tauranga and I'm sure a few other places I can't remember - and that's just for projects.

On weekends we have taken the time to travel to other areas close to the projects and been able to discover more of our own country too.

Lindsay and Judith Middleton have just had their first MMM Fiji experience. What was that like? What did they do? Would they recommend the experience? Read on to find out! (Lindsay and Judith are pictured above taking a break on the floor they tiled.)

We first heard about MMM while talking to a long-time friend who mentioned that he was going to Fiji with MMM. We were pleased and excited but also a bit unsure to hear there was room not just for Lindsay but for both of us. We didn't know if we had skills that would be useful.

We live in Palmerston North and have four adult children who have now all left home. Lindsay and I are at retirement age and

wondering what we'll do in the years ahead while we still have plenty of energy. Both originally teachers, Lindsay is now doing maintenance work at our church and I'm part-time receptionist and administrator there. Lindsay has many home maintenance skills, which he hoped to use in Fiji, but I have very few and went hoping there would be something I could do.

We were part of an MMM team going to Sabeto Christian Camp. The team consisted of three builders and two young women who added fun and laughter to the whole project. We also had three young Fijian guys who wanted to learn some skills. Roy Hogan oversaw the project, along with his wife Rachael and their lovely children.

The main job was to replace the corrugated iron roof on both the dining hall and the bunk block. Other jobs included painting and tiling the kitchen and store rooms. We were very pleased to find that there was plenty of work we could do. Lindsay painted the bargeboards in the dining hall and was shown how to do the tiling in the kitchen. Judith painted many metres of board for building new shelves, bent hundreds of metal brackets for the new guttering and was shown how to do the grouting.

We loved the ethos of MMM. Roy was able to enable everyone who volunteered. We both felt that we used what skills we had and were extended to learn more. Morning devotions and praying together was a special time, as was visiting a local Fijian church on Sunday morning. I don't think we've ever worked with such a focused group of people, living in close quarters, doing everything together, helping each other, working hard, but with such enthusiasm and encouragement with a single goal. It was time taken out of ordinary life to achieve something amazing!

The week prior to our arrival, the Covid testing rules in Fiji were lifted, which freed up our first morning, and enabled us to use that time to help a local pastor build his house. He works full time on a mission farm and was building the house in his spare time. As a team, we were able to install the plywood floor, and louvre

windows, plug up the nail holes in the second-hand corrugated iron cladding the walls, and build and install one of the exterior doors. This small house, 4.8m x 4.8m, is for him and his wife, his father and his two young daughters. We understand that it will be quite a privilege for him to have his own home. In a very real way, it made us realise how privileged we are in New Zealand, and how easily we come to regard it as a right and a reasonable expectation - a very humbling experience on our first morning in Fiji.

Every day was very hot but it made no difference – we just kept going regardless. Looking back, I can't say that there was anything negative about the whole time we were there.

We appreciated accommodation with insect screens and ceiling fans, including in the bedrooms. We enjoyed fresh pineapple, mango, pawpaw and fresh coconut milk when one of the young Fijian men shimmied up a tree and dropped a few down.

I feel our time away has made me rethink the importance of our dependence on

God rather than on the 'things' of the world. We prayed before we went that God would use us and our prayer was answered clearly. We feel our time and effort was a valued part of the team effort. Serving with MMM appeals to us because we feel we can do what we can do to enable others to do what they can do. Anyone with similar willingness and enthusiasm will be made good use of! We recommend it!

## The following report is from a Project Recipient:

Capernwray NZ is an interdenominational Bible School located near Cambridge. We offer a range of academic and outdoor courses as well as conferences, functions and events. These are designed to teach, train and equip those who want to grow and discover personally the life that comes from a relationship with Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and what this means practically in the context of work, church, community and mission.

We have been blessed by the team from MMM and White Wood Homes as they



have rebuilt our school kitchen. Due to the age of the building nearly everything needed replacing so new piles, flooring, walls, ceilings, wiring and fire alarms were required. The expertise that the team brought was something that we just didn't have to do such a large task. Not only did the team bring their expertise, they brought their godly character. We were in the process of coming out of two and half years without students and they came with good humour, encouragement and servant hearts which was such an encouragement for the staff team here. The project was much bigger and more expensive than I anticipated, and the input from

MMM made what was impossible, possible. The kitchen will be a blessing and support the work of Capernwray for many more years.

## Mission Aviation Fellowship







#### The following report is from the Project Recipient, Mark Fox from MAF:

As in the days of "barn raisings" when one farmer's barn was built on one day by the whole community, so the MMM teams moved the renovation of the Kendon-Strong Mission Aviation Fellowship Centre along at a cracking pace to completion. The Centre is situated at the Tauranga Airport and consists of a four-plane hangar, offices and an apartment for overseas staff on leave in NZ. Office space was doubled, and a new board room, storeroom, kitchenette and hangar toilet established. These are now fit for purpose as the Tauranga Centre has become the focus for MAF New Zealand activity. Staff have gradually been relocating here. We can now begin to fulfil our vision of training pilots and engineers for service overseas as well as our normal function of recruiting and financing staff to serve overseas.

MMM joined forces with a local builder, the Curate Care team from Curate Church, several volunteer friends of MAF along with our NZ MAF office staff. We are especially grateful to MMM given that ours has been one of the larger of MMM projects undertaken. For it to take only three months is truly miraculous.

The brief for this project was to repaint the kitchen. This church kitchen is a large commercial type kitchen frequently used by community groups. We were blessed by senior Pastor Ross Banbury and his church team who made our job super easy. All the fittings on the walls had been removed as well as cupboard doors which were being sent away for spray painting. The Lino also had been lifted. This gave us a clear run to get started.

The challenge for us was the high ceiling requiring the use of high gloss paint to meet commercial standards, lots climbing up and down scaffolding, and moving around the island and bench. We were blessed with amazing hospitality, dinners included.



On the team were Team Leader Ken Ogden, wife Eileen, Stephen Douglas, Robert Atkins who travelled daily from his home in Tauranga, Ruth and Eric Jack, and others from the church. Wilson the dog thought he was supervising the whole crew!

the showers and wind, and the job was done in half the time expected - one and a half weeks. So the three week project expectation turned into an amazing effort by all MMM workers and volunteers. I can't not mention the food. Once again thanks to incredible organising by Teri, amazing morning and afternoon teas and lunches were prepared and dished up by



wonderful willing workers.
